Squirrels News

This week in Squirrels we started our Emergencies topic, focussing on Fire and Firemen to begin with. We introduced our History topic about the Great Fire of London by 'putting out' the 'fire' that we had drawn on the back wall of the playground (Thank you to the KS2 children who helped me!) We put it out in the old-fashioned way by lining the children up and passing buckets along the line. Each child had a turn at throwing water on the 'fire'. Great fun and lots of learning! We then went back into the classroom and wrote questions about what we would like to find out about the fire. Over the next few weeks, we will find out the answers! In English we have been writing a poem about bonfires using our senses and choosing the best descriptive words. In Maths we have been looking at fact families, using numicon to show a calculation in up to 8 different ways. This week we have also had a focus on Climate Change, including learning about the importance of trees and plants in the struggle with climate change. In Forest School, Squirrels planted some spring bulbs and did some helpful weeding of our planters. The children also showed excellent teamwork and construction skills when making dens and digging holes. Later, the Hedgehogs children thought they were giants' footprints! A quick note to say that PE is now back on a Wednesday and Friday as Rugby has finished. Have a lovely weekend.

In Badgers this week we had a Diwali party to start our new topic, 'Festivals of Light'. We worked in groups to make beautiful Rangloi patterns which would normally be placed at the front of doorways. We also made paper bag lanterns and coconut sweets. At the end, we sang a song about Diwali lights and learnt a traditional dance.

In English, we watched a film about a wishing machine and considered what we would wish for if we used the machine. There were lots of good ideas, some wishes for themselves and some were for other people. We then read a wishing tale, The King of the Fishes and considered different parts of the story.

We also did lots of work this week on climate change. Badgers decided that they would like to help our school to use less electricity by reminding each other to turn off lights in a room when it is not being used. We made some posters and have chosen some monitors who will check the lights have been turned off.

The children have been thoroughly engaged in understanding the challenges of climate change and biodiversity. They have explored their carbon footprints, thought hard about how they can make a difference and enjoyed designing a 'sustainability island.' We also begun our new topic: "Frozen" and the children discussed solids, liquids and gases and how the tiny particles in them differ. The children then researched the different melting points at which a solid changes to a liquid. They were amazed that gold melts at $1,064^{\circ}C$.

Car Park Reminders

CLOCKS BACK! DARK NIGHTS AHEAD! The clocks went back an hour and summer-time has come to an end. It is important to teach your child the importance of road safety and how to stay safe, particularly as the evenings get darker throughout winter. STOP, LOOK, LISTEN AND THINK! Stop: when you approach a crossing, STOP before you come to the edge of the pavement Look: LOOK for cars, bikes, lorries and other vehicles by looking right, left and right again Listen: LISTEN for vehicles too. You may be able to hear them before you see them Think: is there enough time for you to cross the road safely? Think!
