## Hedgehogs News

In Hedgehogs, our hero focus this week has been farmers. We read a non-fiction text all about life on the farm and wrote about the animals and crops. In phonics sessions we are continuing to work on blending sounds to read words and some of the reception children are able to read words using the letter sounds we have learnt already. It has been very exciting! The year 1s are working on writing words containing 'special friends' (two or more letters together that make a new sound). In maths we have continued to use the conkers, this week to help us with our addition and looking at part-part-whole models. Everyone designed and made a mini scarecrow to protect the crops in the farmer's fields, which are on display in the classroom. For our Harvest Festival, Bea made a traditional harvest wheatsheaf at home and brought it in for us all to see – well done Bea! We also had a lovely singing session on the field with the whole school and it was lovely to get to wave to everyone from our area.

## Squirrels News

In Squirrels this week, we celebrated Harvest. We enjoyed singing on the field, writing acrostic poems and creating a fruit and vegetable alphabet, which, after careful research, included dragon fruit, quince, yam and zucchini.

In our Maths sessions we have been recognising and recalling bonds to 10 and 20. We used numicon and dienes to help us solve problems and wrote number sentences, drew bar models and created part-part-whole models to help explain our answers. We have also compared numbers to 50 using the symbols  $<$  and  $>$ . Colin the greedy crocodile has helped us find the answers, as he always eats the greatest number.

Finally, we have welcomed Miss Moores to our team. We have enjoyed getting to know her and she has supported us with our learning. We look forward to working with her over the next few months.

### **Local lockdown, Class self-isolation and Home Learning**

The teachers will set a range of activities for the children to complete, mainly independently and they will give feedback on work where appropriate. The teachers will not be providing live video lessons but will be in contact with children via Teams and email. If your child has mislaid their Teams log in detail, please contact the school office or class teachers for a new password to be sent. Our Remote Learning protocol has been sent home along with this newsletter for your information.

### Primary & Secondary School Admissions

If your child's birth date is between **1st September 2009** and **31st August 2010** you should complete a **secondary school application** form by **31st October 2020**, for entry into Year 7 in September 2021.

If your child's birth date is between **1st September 2016** and **31st August 2017** you should complete a **primary school application** form by **15th January 2021**, for entry into Reception in September 2021.

All applications are online through your home county school admissions website.

**COVID 19** still dominates our lives and we continue to focus on keeping children and staff safe. Please remind your child of the following to reinforce what they are learning in school:

HANDS – wash hands regularly

FACE – Avoid touching your face

SPACE – Keep a distance from others

Absence from school: **it is crucial that we are made aware if your child has Covid related symptoms.**

Please can we ask that when contacting school or leaving a phone message explaining absence that you inform us of why your child is absent from school. **We also ask that you inform us if a family member has Covid 19 symptoms or is awaiting test results.** Thank you for your understanding.
