Yesterday was World Values Day and it was very fitting that our Governors met to review the survey results for our Christian Values. Thank you to everyone who voted. We now have our 3 Core Christian values: **Kindness, Thankfulness and Perseverance.**

After half term the children will be working in classes to develop a deeper understanding of our values and how they relate to our school community through a Values focus week.

Next week we are holding the first of our termly Pupil Progress Meetings, an opportunity for the staff to discuss the achievements of every child and how we can improve our provision to support their needs and stretch their potential. This term is particularly vital as we assess how children are re-integrating into school and determine any gaps in their learning that have come about as a result of the extended school closure. ### **Primary & Secondary School Admissions**

If your child's birth date is between **1st September 2009** and **31st August 2010** you should complete a **secondary school application** form by **31st October 2020**, for entry into Year 7 in September 2021.

If your child's birth date is between **1st September 2016** and **31st August 2017** you should complete a **primary school application** form by **15th January 2021**, for entry into Reception in September 2021.

All applications are online through your home county school admissions website.

### **Clarification around self-isolating**

Please be reminded that your child should not come to school if they have any of the following symptoms:

- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough – this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste

Most people with coronavirus have at least 1 of these symptoms. We ask you to follow Government guidance: isolate as a family, arrange for your child to have a covid test and keep school informed at all times. If you are struggling to book a test, we have a small number of test kits in school that we have been given by the Government for families to use so please talk to us about this.

**STEP 1 - Fill your box**  
Find an old shoebox. Ideally a regular sized one (max size 39cm long x 24cm wide x 12cm deep). Wrap the bottom of the box and the lid separately in festive paper.

Decide who you'd like the box to go to and tick the appropriate box for age/sex on the **Category & Contents** label, and attach it to the lid of the box.

Fill your box with goodies, leaving them unwrapped. See the 'Filling your box' section for instructions. Fill out the "Contents" section of the **Category & Contents** label and tell us what's inside your box. Secure box lid with elastic band.


**STEP 2 - Make a shipping donation**  
Getting your box to Southeast Europe is expensive so we also ask for a **£3.00 donation per box to help cover the cost.**  
If you are making more than one box you can make a combined donation.





Dear Miss Ward,

Thanks for contacting us about plastic waste. We know how important an issue this is and are committed to doing our bit.

Packaging plays an important part in making sure our products reach you in the best condition. However, we also understand the impact it has on the environment. We're working hard to reduce this impact by adopting a 360 degree approach. This involves using less packaging, making more of it recyclable, and helping you dispose of it responsibly.

Sainsbury's has always been clear and transparent about the sourcing commitments we make. We were the first major retailer to commit to move towards 100% British Free Range shell egg and included in this was our commitment to move away from plastic packs to 100% pulp. We would have met that commitment by April of this year if it had not been impacted by the combined factors of Avian Influenza and Covid-19.

This has put a large strain on our pulp packaging supplier and as a result they haven't been able to meet demand and therefore for a short period of time we have moved some lines to plastic whilst trying to locate another pulp packaging supplier to support, our intention is to revert ASAP and we are now starting to move back to pulp or cardboard on a number of lines.

I hope I've been able to reassure you how seriously we take the issue of plastic use, and how committed we are to reducing it.
